Isaiah 6:1-8 – May 24, 2026

“Worship is not a performance we perfect, but an invitation we extend...Where every heart is welcomed to behold and exalt Jesus.”

Point 1 - Worship invites us to Recognize His Reign We See God First

- In a moment of national loss and personal grief, Isaiah sees the Lord high and exalted.
- Earthly kings may die, but the King of glory still reigns.

Key Idea Worship is not escaping reality; it is re-centering reality around a holy God who reigns forever.

“Worship begins when we intentionally shift our attention from what has died... to who still reigns.”

What do we learn? We must choose to:

1. Give our first attention to God instead of our grief or uncertainty...
2. Behold God’s holiness before we bring our requests...
3. Anchor our hearts in the One who reigns when everything else feels unstable...

Point 2 - Worship invites us to Reckon with our Reality We See Ourselves Honestly

- In the light of God’s holiness, Isaiah sees his own sin clearly.
- Confession is not the opposite of worship; it is an essential part of worship.

“Worship is the place where we stop pretending and start telling the truth.”

Key Idea You cannot build a real friendship with Jesus while hiding your real self.

What do we learn? We must choose to:

1. Stop pretending and start telling the truth about our sin...
2. Allow God’s holiness to surface what is unclean in our lives...
3. Turn our “Woe is me” moments into worship instead of shame...

Point 3 - Worship invites us to Receive His Grace We Are Cleansed by God

- Isaiah does not earn forgiveness; he receives it as a gift.
- The coal from the altar points to the atonement work of Jesus.

Key Idea God never exposes our sin without also extending His grace.

What do we learn? We must choose to:

1. Receive God’s cleansing instead of trying to fix ourselves...
2. Believe there is now no condemnation for those in Christ Jesus...
3. Let grace restore us so we can draw near to God with confidence...

Point 4 - Worship invites us to Respond in Surrender We Offer Ourselves Fully

- After seeing God, seeing ourselves, and receiving grace, Isaiah says, “Here am I. Send me.”
- Worship always moves us from encounter to mission.

Key Idea True worship does not end at the altar — it sends us into the world as surrendered servants.

What do we learn? We must choose to:

1. Move from “Woe is me” to “Here am I”...
2. Offer our lives as a living sacrifice in response to God’s mercy...
3. Let worship fuel our mission instead of just our emotions...

Main Idea: Foster a fuller friendship with Jesus in 2026 through worship that sees God, sees self, receives grace, and responds in surrender.
